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## Wizard's Wardrobe Receives Grant for Tutoring

Wizard's Wardrobe, the tutoring project that has grown out of our partnership with Giffen Memorial Elementary School in the heart of Albany's South End, has been recently successful in receiving a grant from the Picotte Foundation that will help with expenses going towards tutoring, including paying for our vetting of tutors. The grant awarded exceeded the \$2,730 that we requested for the tutor vetting by \$3,000 to a total of \$5,730 (more than doubling our request) and opened it to include other tutor expenses. This was very generous of the Picotte family. After months of frustration and red tape, the Wizard's Wardrobe, a 501(c)3 organization, is finally moving along.

We held our Kick-off event on Tuesday, Nov. 29, and had about 50 people in attendance (See pictures on p. 9.). Assembly Hall was beautifully appointed with soft lighting and large pictures of our "home" at 20 Rensselaer Street, around the corner from Giffen Elementary School.

Renovations there are also moving along, and we were able to get into the tutoring space with paint brushes and rollers and have it all primed for color. The main underlying coat of gray was added on Dec. 17, and the space will look more like a castle by Jan. 8, under the artistic direction of Leslie Roccario and David Hinchen. We are excited to start our tutoring and hope to do so on January 17. If you are interested in helping with this, we have a full day training scheduled for Feb. 11. Mark your calendars!

## January 2017 Adult and High School Christian Education Hour **Terrorism, Fanaticism, and Hate**

The High School Curriculum for the 2016-17 year is entitled *Terrorism/Fanaticism/Hate*. The class has been examining global issues (terrorism); then reducing the scope to national concerns (fanaticism) and finally, focusing on the individual (hate). During the month of January, a series of classes has been created, entitled: *A Month on Diversity: Disarming Hate*. Each of the four Sunday morning Christian Education hours (9:30-10:30) will be devoted to promoting understanding and tolerance and will meet with Adult Education. The schedule is as follows:

### Sunday, January 8, 9:30 am Black Lives Matter Jacqui C. Williams, Activist

Jacqui C. Williams is an independent consultant with thirty years of experience conducting trainings to clergy, rape crisis programs, K-12 school, colleges, community groups, health care professionals, mental health providers, law enforcement, prosecutors, and related professionals. She worked in the field of ending sexual violence since 1991 as the Warren County Rape Crisis



Coordinator, Policy and Education Director of the NYS Coalition Against Sexual Assault and Director of Outreach and Training for the NYS DCJS Office of Sex Offender Management. Ms. Williams has conducted training on identifying and dismantling various forms of oppression in her professional work and in a volunteer capacity as a *Beyond Categorical Thinking* facilitator for the Unitarian Universalist Association since 2001. She served as the Co-President of Diverse and Revolutionary Unitarian Universalist Multicultural Ministries (DRUUMM), and was elected as a member of

the General Assembly Planning Committee and Presidential Search Committee. Her community work includes direct work with adolescent girls and advocacy for improvement of education and quality of life issues in Albany. She was an at-large member of the Albany Community Police Advisory Committee (ACPAC) from 2011 to 2014, member of Capital Area Against Mass Incarceration (CAAMI) and Black Lives Matter Upstate, a chapter of the Black Lives Matter National Network and part of the Movement for Black Lives particularly the South End where she lives.

Jacqui also is the Founding Director of Filling in the Gaps in American History (FIGAH), which is research on people of African descent who are not usually found in text books. She shares this via a Facebook page and website www.figah.us plus does presentations on people, places and events from a more inclusive lens.

Tim O'Toole has recorded the event for posterity, so if you missed the performance, don't worry, there should be a DVD floating around for you to borrow.







## **Inequality as a Religious Test**

[Editor's note: the following reflection is from the pen of Jim Wallis, editor of *Sojourners* Magazine.]

If you believe that every human being is made in the image of God — *imago dei;* if you believe that every individual person represented in economic statistics is a child of God; if you believe that in nearly all religious traditions, loving your neighbor as you love yourself follows directly after loving God; and if you believe, regardless of your conception of God, that human beings are all brothers and sisters tied together, then income inequality is a spiritual issue, a moral issue, and a religious test of our belief.

A great example of this is the story of the Good Samaritan. Here's a man robbed and mugged, left by the side of the road — just as so many today are "mugged" and left behind by the global economy. Various religious leaders pass him by on the other side of the road, refusing to lend their aid. But then a person from a different culture, ethnicity, and race does stop and does help. He risks his security, his resources, and his time to lift this beaten man up to a new life. That Samaritan exemplifies what a neighbor does, says Jesus. However, there is some good news regarding global inequality, as writer Nicholas Kristof pointed out in a New York Times column that extreme global poverty has been cut in half in the last twenty years. This is one of the greatest stories that does not get told nearly enough.

As a result, women and girls are being educated at rates never before seen. Girls reading books are a greater threat to men wielding guns than other men with guns: in the 1980s, only half of girls in developing countries completed elementary school; now, 80 percent do. And fewer children (though still far too many) are dying of preventable causes — in 1990, more than 12 million children died before the age of 5. This toll has since dropped by more than half.

The dramatic decline in extreme poverty reflects the UN commitment to cutting poverty in half in its Millennium Development Goals, as well as global markets and movements involving people of all religious traditions, which have helped raise many

families out of poverty. Religious participation has been critical to progress on key issues of human dignity, like debt transformation, HIV/AIDS and malaria prevention, global agriculture development, medical care, and reducing hunger and poverty.

Now, nations at the UN have just pledged to finish the job — making a commitment to Sustainable Development Goals that focus on *ending* extreme poverty worldwide by 2030. For the first time in history, experts in this field are now saying that ending extreme poverty is finally possible. And when we reduce poverty, inequality can be reduced as well.

But economic growth, by itself, is not enough to end extreme poverty. That growth must be directly aimed at ending poverty, as World Bank President Jim Kim said in his video address to the Parliament. Strikingly, both the World Bank and the UN are saying they now have the "evidence" of what works and doesn't work to end extreme poverty, but they don't have the *moral authority* or the constituencies to generate the political will to make this crucial and moral goal happen — and faith communities do. And that's why these institutions are seeking alliances with us. There is a great opportunity here for religious communities.

Of course, some inequality will always be part of the human condition and our societies. But as inequality has become so stark, it is time for people of all faiths to exercise our prophetic mission and energy, calling for the kind of equity, fairness, and justice that our faiths require of us. It is time for us to require serious political accountability from our public leaders.

## Goal of \$500,000 Reached and Received

Four years ago, in January 2013, the Session directed a campaign be commenced in honor of our church's 250th Anniversary and a goal of \$500,000 was established. Dedicated projects were: construction of an elevator, a new set of bells for the bell choir, certain organ repairs, 10% of amount raised (\$50,000) to the Permanent Endowment Fund and 10% of the amount raised (\$50,000) to the Outreach and Mission 250th Anniversary Account.

Two years ago we announced achieving our goal, but much of that was still in the form of outstanding pledges. Now we can happily say that the full goal has been reached in receipts as well. The elevator, the new bells and the organ repairs are all in place. The financial commitments to the two endowment funds have been made. At the request of the Session, significant roof repairs were also funded by the Campaign.

Finally, we anticipate a small surplus that will be spent as directed by the Session.
