One: It is by God's grace that we can become followers:


All: people who are fearful, yet gifted with courage beyond wonder.

Breaking of the Bread and Communion of the People

The congregation is served at the front of the sanctuary, coming forward by the center aisle and returning by the side aisles. Communion is by intinction – take a piece of bread from the loaf or a piece of pita from the plate, dip it into the cup of juice, and eat. When served, you may respond by saying "Amen," "Thanks be to God," or another response. You may choose a sealed prepackaged communion element from one of the baskets – the ones with "GF" are gluten-free. If you prefer to receive communion in the pew, you may remain in your seat and signal an usher. Servers will bring you the elements.

Litany of Remembrance Explanation

We begin our celebration of African American History Month with a Litany of Remembrance and the lighting of a candle. It is a tradition among many in the African American community to remember the ancestors during large gatherings and celebrations such as family reunions, weddings and African American history observances. This is often done with a litany, prayers and a candle. We continue that tradition, invoking our church ancestors and all who came before, with our *Litany of Remembrance* today and the lighting of the candle of remembrance each Sunday during African American History Month.

Black History Month was officially recognized by President Gerald Ford in 1976 who asked us to "seize the opportunity to honor the too-often neglected accomplishments of Black Americans in every area of endeavor throughout our history."

Today, in 2025, there are those who want to remove BHM from the calendar. Heather Cox Richardson tells us, "This February 1, neither the Pentagon nor the State Department will recognize Black History Month." President Trump has also revoked a 60 year-old executive order for the protection of equal opportunity. We must remember.

Set up will take place at 9:00-10:30am. We especially need clean-up volunteers from about 12:45-1:45pm.


The **paraments** (the cloth on the pulpit, lectern, and communion table) are green, because that is the liturgical color for Ordinary Time (January 13 through March 4). Green is a sign of life in nature and as such it represents growth, life and hope. Most of the Church's year is Ordinary Time. The **pastor's stoles** (the cloth around their necks) are made from Kente cloth and are worn during Black History Month

"Sponsor Timber" The Underground Railroad Interpretive Center, know to us as the Stephen and Harriet **M**vers Residence. expanding and we can help. They are building an Interpretive Center to be located on the Myers property. This building will be supported, in large part, by timbers from a barn built in the 1760's by a Dutch family, using the labor of enslaved Africans. Bringing New York State history into the present is the goal of the Interpretive Center. The new building will

physically embody that goal, a goal that is even more important in this era of some trying to erase the history of African-Americans. How can we help? By "buying" one of the timbers! The "sponsor a timber" campaign has a goal of \$5,000 as our contribution to this important building. There will be additional information in Assembly Hall. Let us ioin the Education Underground Railroad Center in sending a message that history belongs to All of us!







